


# CEO'S STATEMENT

As we continue to navigate the currents of challenging times, we at the James River Association have the immense fortune of being able to find a constant source of inspiration from our supporters, volunteers, partners, and fellow staff that provide us the spark and motivation to keep working towards protecting and connecting people with our invaluable James River.

2021 brought new difficulties to our world both globally as well as locally, from emerging Covid-19 variants in the pandemic that caused many schools to cancel JRA education trips to stalled progress in certain benchmarks related to the health of our waterways. Our 2021 State of the James report, while encouraging in many ways, also revealed significant obstacles to our goals. We received our first ever 0% indicator in the history of the report for American Shad, a critical alarm that we must take immediate action to restore this iconic fish, and a symbol that we still have much work to do resolving key barriers to a fully healthy James.

JRA works to achieve a Grade-A James River through four steps of community engagement: Awareness, Appreciation, Action, and Advocacy.

### **DIVING IN: THE FUTURE OF ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION ON THE JAMES**

As the guardian of the river, we want to ensure that everyone has a personal connection to the James and is continuously inspired to maintain its health. To provide wider access to the river, we plan to establish River Centers in three of our watershed communities where JRA has offices for education and community activities along the watershed.

In August, we announced our partnership with the Capital Region Land Conservancy and The Conservation Fund to purchase and protect a 5.2-acre waterfront parcel of land on Dock Street in downtown Richmond. We will own 0.85 acres of this land on which to build a new educational River Center, while the rest of the land will be transferred to the City of Richmond to become part of the James River Park System.

In September, we celebrated a groundbreaking ceremony in partnership with Amherst County to kick off construction at Riveredge Park in Madison Heights that will expand public river access to more people and serve a greater variety of river users. We also announced our plans for significant improvements to our Upper James River Center with the goals to help strengthen current education programs and serve as a focal point for the river in the region.

We plan to make similar improvements to turn our Lower James River Center in Williamsburg into a state-ofthe-art education space, and we purchased a vessel to become a 'Floating Classroom', serving students on the river from Richmond to the Bay.




